18th Annual Homes For Families Fundraising Breakfast

The Road Home Dane County hosted our 18th annual Homes for Families Fundraising Breakfast on Thursday, Nov 3. Thanks to our committed sponsors, table hosts, and local partners, our half-hour virtual program reached hundreds of viewers throughout Dane County and beyond and connected our agency with dozens of new donors whose contributions will play a direct role in combating family homelessness in our community.

Many attendees appreciated how the program showcases the breadth of programs, personalities, and perspectives that make The Road Home such a unique and impactful organization. In just 30 minutes, viewers heard from current and former clients, agency staff, members of our board of directors, community partners, and individual donors who continue to support The Road Home's life-changing programs and services.

One of the stars of this year's program is Courtney, a local entrepreneur and current client of a permanent supportive housing program operated through a partnership between The Road Home and Stone House Development, Inc. With support from her housing advocate and the Wisconsin Women's Business Initiative Corporation, Courtney has forged a path from homelessness to ownership of a profitable and expanding small business, Luscious Beauty by Courtney. In hopes of providing motivation and encouragement to those facing similar challenges, Courtney spoke openly of how hardships stemming from homelessness, domestic violence, and her experience as an individual with a disability have shaped her entrepreneurial spirit and contributed to her long-term professional and personal success.

"When it's time to pick yourself up, don't do it for anybody else," said Courtney. "Do it for yourself. That's where I want my products to come in to play for my clients and customers. I want my products to make you feel like . . . you're it. Like you're special, because life should look and feel as beautiful as you."

In addition to demonstrating the efficacy of the programs offered by The Road Home, Courtney's story contributes to a long overdue shift around the perception of family homelessness, from a narrative that focuses not only on vulnerability and deprivation, but also makes space for equally critical factors like resilience, knowledge, and potential.

"It just takes for that one person to show belief in what they want for their own life journey for them to take the step forward," explains Dominique Christian, program director at The Road Home. "And that's what we as case managers see ourselves as being."



Dominique Christian (pictured left) has been promoted to the position of Program Director, while Meghan Salzwedel (pictured right) has been hired to the position of Development Director. Both have hit the ground running in their new roles, putting the agency in capable and experienced hands as we prepare to turn the calendar into 2023.

Dominique joined The Road Home full-time in 2018 as a Housing Advocate before being

promoted to Program Manager of scattered-site programs in early 2020. In her capacity as Program Director, she will be charged with overseeing each of The Road Home's 13 housing programs as well as managing the nonprofit's 15 program staff. As a member of the executive team, Dominique will also be responsible for a range of high-level duties related to staffing, budgeting and development, agency operations, and community advocacy.

"Madison is a great place to live and it breaks your heart when you hear about kids in our community who do not have a home. Everybody should have a place to call home," says Karen Golden, donor to The Road Home. Karen and her husband Tom recently spoke during our virtual fundraising Breakfast about why they choose to give to our mission of ending family homelessness. The Golden's shared their perspective on the importance of giving, stating, "As parents of four kids, we have empathy for others and we want all children to have a place to call home. In Dane County, that should never happen -- that kids don't have a place to call home."

While reflecting on their own children who are now young adults, Tom and Karen noted that they worked hard to instill the importance of giving even at a young age. The Road Home serves 250 annually -- including more than 500 children -- in our housing programs, which are dedicated to ending the cycle of family homelessness. Tom summed up his passion for giving by sharing, "I think your team does great work and I think there's no better calling than helping families find homes."

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Dear Road Home Community,

The name of my business is Luscious Beauty by Courtney. I knew that I was capable of going back to work or working, but I wasn't mentally fit to work at a typical 9 to 5. I wanted something that was mine, so I looked into how to open my own business. Once I had stable housing, I took a few courses with a program called WWBIC (Wisconsin Women's Business Initiative Corporation) and from there I've pretty much been teaching myself how to manage, run and operate my own business.

I've been through a lot. I've struggled with homelessness. I'm disabled. And doing this all disabled on a fixed income is not easy. Like I said, I knew I was capable of doing more and this last change I ended up moving back home -- homeless. After being a victim of domestic abuse, and I don't mind talking about this because I want people to



know me. And just in case anyone else is maybe going through the same thing, having doubts in themselves, I want them to know that you are capable of more.

It took a very long time for me to be this outspoken. It took a very long time for me to stand up for myself and realize what I want. My saying is life should look and feel as beautiful as you. When it's time to pick yourself up, don't do it for anyone else, do it for yourself. And that's were I want my skincare products to come into play for my clients and customers. I want my products to make you feel like you're it, you're special and you feel good.
