Understanding the Crisis of Homelessness and The Road Home's Compassionate Response

The Faces of Homelessness

Homelessness does not discriminate, touching the lives of people from diverse backgrounds, ages, and walks of life. From veterans and families with children to the elderly and the youth, the face of homelessness is as varied as it is heartbreaking. Root Causes: A Complex Web

Why I Give: Matt Julian



I have been a Social Worker since 2009, and specifically worked in homeless services for the last nine years. Throughout my career, I have interacted with The Road Home in numerous capacities. I have always been impressed by the leadership they provide within homeless services, and the quality of the services they provide the families they serve. Social Work is my second career. I initially completed a Culinary Arts degree at Madison College and worked for a short time in that field.

While I was working in kitchens, I was volunteering at a recovery clinic in town. I found myself happiest on the days I volunteered, so I decided to return to school. I have lived in Dane County almost my entire life. I live with my amazing daughter, Ruby (10) and our dog, Chonk. I joined the Board of Directors in March of 2023. As a first year Board member, I've spent most of my time learning and listening about the operations and culture at The Road Home. I have particularly enjoyed my time working on the Development Committee to plan fundraising events which are crucial to achieving our mission at The Road Home.

When I first began working in homeless services, I remember seeing a family pack up all their belongings at a day shelter to move back into their vehicle for the evening. I was stunned to see the daily grind families experiencing homelessness go through. The lack of affordable housing often displaces families and traumatizes both the parents and children. The Road Home seeks to end family homelessness and to support families in healing from the trauma they endured. It's hard not to connect to that mission, especially when I've seen it in action at The Road Home.

To end homelessness, it takes housing families, supporting healing, building landlord relationships, navigating complex systems, constant fundraising to meet the needs and grow the programs. It will take repeated efforts to chip away at the disparities that exist in our community that lead to homelessness. When choosing where to focus my dollars, I want to support an agency that provides those services at a high quality. It has been pretty clear working in homeless services in our community that The Road Home excels in all of these areas.

Amarah, a local mother, was in need of safe, stable childcare for her 3 young kids. After experiencing literal homelessness, Amarah was enrolled in a permanent supportive housing program at The Road Home. Along with her on-site housing advocate, she was able to look into options for affordable, quality childcare with the foundation of stable housing secured. Amarah's housing advocate at The Road Home helped connect her to funding for The Playing Field where she says her children thrived. "It truly takes a village and sometimes people forget that," says Amarah. "The class sizes were small, teachers engaged with my children and had a positive impact on their lives". Without family in the area for supplemental childcare support, The Playing Field opened many doors for Amarah and her family.

And with her children so well cared for, she was able to have breathing room and respite mothers of young children are so often in need of and deserve. The relief of quality childcare along with housing has empowered Amarah to continue to dream for her family's future.
